Purpose	The purpose of this award is to equip the learner with the knowledge, skill and competence necessary for plant propagation.

- 9 Sow seeds, both outdoors and under protection, to include seed-bed preparation, nutrition, mycorrhizal associations, containers, methods of sowing, labelling, composts, pricking off and aftercare
- 10 Carry out routine propagation skills with different types of cuttings to include selection and collection of material, preparation of material, insertion, watering and labelling
- 11 Carry out routine division and layering to include division of bulbs, tubers, rhizomes or crowns and simple or stool layering including aftercare and maintenance of both propagation methods
- 12 Implement procedures to create and maintain a safe working environment including safety standards regarding lifting, carrying and handling plants, tools and equipment.

### 2. FET Award Standards

QQI award standards are determined within the National Framework of Qualifications (NFQ), <u>http://www.nfq-qqi.com</u>. QQI determines standards for the education and training awards that it makes itself and that are made by providers to whom it has delegated authority to make an award. Providers offering programmes leading to QQI awards **must** have their programme(s) validated in accordance with current validation policy (see <u>www.qqi.ie</u>).

Award standards are designed to be consistent with the NFQ's award classes i.e. major, special purpose, supplemental and minor awards. They are expressed in terms of **learning outcomes** i.e. concise statements of what the learner is expected to know or be able to do in order to achieve a particular award. Award standards are thresholds, they describe standards of knowledge, skill or competence to be acquired, and where appropriate, demonstrated, by a learner before an award may be made.

Award standards will be reviewed from time to time as necessary. Minor changes may be made by the QQI executive outside the review cycle where necessary. Changes to standards are published on QQI's website. Providers with validated programmes and providers with delegated authority to make awards are responsible for monitoring relevant standards and making necessary responses to changes.

#### 3. FET Credit

Every FET certificate and component specification includes an FET credit value (Table 1). FET credit is quantified in multiples of 5 FET credits (up to 50 hours of learner effort). Learner effort is based on the time taken by typical learners at the level of the award to achieve the learning outcomes for the award. It includes all learning time involved including: guided learning hours, self-directed learning and assessment.
