Purpose	The purpose of this award is to equip the learner with the knowledge, skill and competence to assess heritage and cultural products from a tourism development perspective, and to facilitate an understanding and appreciation of Ireland's cultural and natural heritage.
Learning Outcomes	<p>Learners will be able to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1 Assess the role of the cultural heritage product in international and national tourism including key Irish and international heritage attractions2 Assess current issues in relation to sustainable heritage conservation, including the impacts of interpretive infrastructure, visitor pressure and inaccurate or inappropriate interpretation3 Appraise the work of the main bodies involved in the support, development, protection and promotion of Irish culture, heritage and natural resources4 Summarise the course of Irish history from the earliest times to the present day, describing the key

civilisations, influences and events which have shaped Irish history, society, tradition, folklore and culture

- 5 Explain the origin, antiquity, key literary genres and current status of the Irish language
- 6 Assess cultures and traditions which have been influenced by the Irish and related opportunities for Irish tourism
- 7 Outline Ireland's archaeological heritage with a detailed description of Ireland's UNESCO World Heritage sites
- 8 Assess the major phases, styles and examples of Ireland's architectural heritage
- 9 Assess the development and location of arts and crafts and associated industries in Ireland, including painting, sculpture, stained glass, pottery, lace, ceramics, woodwork, textiles and fashion design
- 10 Assess Ireland's cultural, arts and literary legacy including major writers, representative classical and contemporary literature, poetry, drama, cinema, music and dance
- 11 Analyse the perception of Ireland abroad including key cultural influences such as literature, dance, art, music and drama
- 12 Outline the evolution of Irish cuisine and beverages
- 13 Provide information on the development of sports in Ireland, including the role, history and structure of the GAA
- 14 Provide information about genealogical research
- 15 List popular festivals and summer schools in Ireland
- 16 Describe key aspects of modern Irish life , including:
 - Population
 - Government and political structures
 - Education
 - Religion

- Main industries
 - Agriculture and fishing
 - Economy
 - Health and social welfare
 - Employment
 - Emigration and immigration
- 17 Describe a range of quality retail experiences for the visitor
 - 18 Describe significant natural and physical features of Ireland including geology, flora, fauna, habitats, marine life
 - 19 Explain the history and current status of agriculture and forestry in Ireland, identifying trees, crops and livestock
 - 20 Explain the role of Ireland's peat bogs as a living archive, an ancient habitat, a carbon store, a source of fuel, and a habitat for rare and endangered species

Assessment

Description

Skills Demonstration

A skills demonstration is used to assess a wide range of practical based learning outcomes including practical skills and knowledge. A skills demonstration will require the learner to complete a task or series of tasks that demonstrate a range of skills.

Examination - Theory

An examination provides a means of assessing a learner's ability to recall and apply knowledge, skills and understanding within a set period of time and under clearly specified conditions.

A theory-based examination assesses the ability to recall, apply and understand specific theory and knowledge.

Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL)

Learners may be assessed on the basis of their prior knowledge and experience. Providers must be specifically quality assured to assess learners by this means. To do so they must complete B10, see Provider's Quality Assurance Guidelines and be included on the Register of RPL approved providers. Access

2. FET Award Standards

Award standards are thresholds, they describe standards of knowledge, skill or competence to be acquired, and where appropriate, demonstrated, by a learner before an award may be made.

Award standards will be reviewed from time to time as necessary. Minor changes may be made by the QQI executive outside the review cycle where necessary. Changes to standards are published on QQI's website. Providers with validated programmes and providers with delegated authority to make awards are responsible for monitoring relevant standards and making necessary responses to changes.

3. FET Credit

Every FET certificate and component specification includes an FET credit value (Table 1). FET credit is quantified in multiples of 5 FET credits (up to 50 hours of learner effort). Learner effort is based on the time taken by typical learners at the level of the award to achieve the learning outcomes for the award. It includes all learning time involved including: guided learning hours, self-directed learning and assessment.

Guide to Level

Learning outcomes at this level include a comprehensive range of skills which may be vocationally-specific and/or of a general supervisory nature, and require detailed theoretical understanding. The outcomes also provide for a particular focus on learning skills. The outcomes relate to working in a generally autonomous way to assume design and/or management and/or administrative responsibilities. Occupations at this level would include higher craft, junior technician and supervisor.
